The photos didn't do the workshop justice, and the endless possibilities for embellishment are intriguing. I have been dipping into my buttons, which I acquired from my son-in-law's deceased grandmother. Several jars and bags and boxes are piled around the house in various places. She had an inordinate number of peachy colored buttons in one of the bags that were perfect for one hanging. Who knows what else I can find to do with the stuff laying about? My husband sure wishes I'd find things to do with this stuff. Frank's grandmother was a saver. She's not my relative, but I think I have the same trait. I have old lace trims, zippers of many colors and sizes taken out of old clothes, buttons, ribbons, some netting of various colors (mostly pastels) and very fine crochet thread with crochet hooks in the zero and double zero sizes. ### Nominations

It's that time of year again. Nominations for a new slate of officers needs to be chosen. Martha, Barb, and Gail have graciously decided to stay in their respective offices of president, secretary and treasurer for another year. Sandy has been vice president for the past two years and has done a great job. Therefore, the only open position is that of vice president. I made my plea at the meeting last week and am writing this article to reach those who were not there.

In my opinion the office of vice president has become much more complicated than it needs to be. I have been in the guild for about 25 years and have seen a lot in that time. I also belong to a couple of other guilds and trust me, they are all experiencing the same issues as we are. First of all I want to quote from the bylaws what the job of vice president entails. Article 6, Section 2 states: It shall be the duty of the vice president to assume the president's duties in the event of her absence. The vice president will be responsible for programs, workshops, the holiday party, the annual birthday party and the annual picnic. The vice president will honor all previously committed contracts for programs and workshops.

It does not state a particular number of workshops per month must be offered. When I first joined the guild we had only 1 or 2 workshops per year. As our numbers



swelled over the years there became a need for more workshops and there was never a problem in filling them. That was when we were at our membership peak which was around 120. Now our membership is 53. The needs for a smaller group are different than for a large group. We also never had a national teacher in the early years. Again, when our membership was high we had both the finances (from increased dues collection) and the interest to support a national teacher. The description does not say that you have to have a national teacher. Only that if there is one contracted to come before you take office that you must follow through and take care of it. The cost for national teachers has skyrocketed, particularly because of the increased cost of getting them here. The holiday party, birthday party and picnic are among the listed duties. That takes care of 3 of the 12 meetings per year so programs only have to be arranged for 9 meetings.

Since I am taking a walk down memory lane there is one other item I would like to mention that is unrelated to the election of officers. Originally the guild met on a monthly basis from September through June. We took the months of July and August off to enjoy our too brief summer. When our membership swelled it was decided that we would meet on a monthly basis after a motion, discussion, and a vote to change the bylaws was made. Again, the meetings were always full regardless of what month they took place. With less than 1/2 of our peak membership currently maybe it is time to revisit that issue and make another change to the way it was. Just a thought.

If anyone is interested in becoming vice president please let one of us know. Or, if you can recommend someone we would appreciate that also. We are trying to make contact with everyone in the guild. If no one steps up to the plate I have no idea how that will impact the guild.




